



Provincial gaol, New Westminster, where Slumach was hanged in 1891.





FIRST INDICATION of the existence of Lost Creek Mine came some forty years ago when the Indian Slummock arrived in New Westminster with a knapsack bulging with nuggets of gold.

Naturally, an Indian with a lot of raw gold became the centre of attraction; men of all types flocked about him in effort to learn the location of his strike. But Slummock stubbornly refused to divulge the source of his new-found wealth.

SOMEONE with greed in his soul followed Volcanic Brown into the wilderness...toward his Eldorado. Volcanic knew that he was being followed because... he could see the smoke of his pursuer's camp fire some distance behind him.

WILBUR ARMSTRONG, a Washington prospector of seventy-two, plunged into the mountains of the Pitt range recently on his tenth trip in search of Slumagh's mine. For ten years Armstrong has made his pilgrimage every summer, but this, he says, will be the last if it proves as barren as the others.

Armstrong is not the only man who has headed search parties in the attempt to locate this hidden treasure, whose location is asserted to be within twenty miles of the head of Pitt lake, yet which has been discovered by but one man, who is now dead, since Slumagh, the Indian after whom it was named, was hanged in the jail yard at New Westminster in 1891.

Walter Jackson, the second discoverer, panned out thousands of dollars' worth of gold when he located it in 1901.

This illustration by Fred Bosman from In Search of a Legend shows Slumach murdering Louis Bee. It reflects the unreliable press accounts of the 1800s.

There was only one witness present, Seymour, and both he and Louis Bee were sitting in the dugout as the shooting happened.

Following is part of the witness Seymour testimony before Justice of the Peace Pittendrigh, 3 November 1890.

8 September 1890

HEARD the report of a gun on the opposite shore that is the left-hand side going upstream. Louis Bee proposed to go across to where the shot was fired as he thought it might be white men there. When we got to the shore I saw the prisoner Slumach coming out of the long grass and told Louis he was coming. When Slumach got near, Louis Bee asked him what he was firing at. He gave no answer but kept walking up towards our canoe until he reached the edge of the river.





Without any further word he presented his gun at Louis Bee, the deceased, and fired. After the shot was fired I saw blood coming out of Louis Bee's arm at the back of his shoulder. He grasped hold of the side of the canoe and after a few seconds fell overboard and sank in about two-and-a-half feet of water. The canoe was afloat and about 15 or 16 feet from the shore—the water here is shallow for some distance out.



"The snow was too deep around the base of the rock and I was unable to locate and photograph the letter "J" carved in the Rock." Don Waite, 1975.

Some of the nuggets were as big as walnuts and there were many chunks carrying quartz. After sizing up carefully I saw that there were millions stowed away in the little cracks. On account of the weight I buried part of the gold at the foot of a large tent-shaped rock facing the creek. You can't miss it. There is a mark cut out in it. (Jackson's letter)
